Abstract:

The Berry Family Papers center around Alonzo Freeman Berry (1846-1929), who served in the 8th New Hampshire Volunteer Regiment during the Civil War. His brother, Albert H. Berry (1845-1864), was in the 12th New Hampshire Volunteers, and step brother, George Washington Dame (1842-1863), in the 13th New Hampshire Volunteers. Neither Albert nor George survived the war, and the collection contains many letters from Alonzo but only a few from Albert and one from George. There is also ephemera about Alonzo's involvement in the post-war Grand Army of the Republic fraternal organization, but almost nothing except a few scattered letters of family members about his post-war life.

Collection Overview

Biographical Information:

Alonzo Freeman Berry (1846-1929) was one of three children born into a farming family in Strafford, New Hampshire. After his father, Ezekiel (1817-1849) died, his mother, Mary (Hayes) Berry (1811-1891), married Asa Dame (1818-1862).

Asa Dame enlisted in the 8th Infantry, Union Army in 1861 and died of an unidentified disease in 1862 at Camp Parapet, LA. Dame's son, George Washington Dame (1842-1863), and Mary's sons Alonzo and Albert (1845-1864), also served in the Union Army during the Civil War: Albert in the 12th New Hampshire Volunteers, Alonzo in the 8th New Hampshire Volunteers, and George in the 13th New Hampshire Volunteers. It appears from military records that Alonzo served in the same sector and at the same time as his step-father, and that he re-enlisted after Asa's death. Only Alonzo survived the war. He returned to farming in Barrington, New Hampshire, married Olive Brown (1848-1889) on August 29, 1866 at Barrington, and had several children: Charles (1876-1905), Warren (1887-1955), and Mary Berry Conway (1871-1961).

Olive died at Barrington on June 23, 1889. Alonzo died there on May 10, 1929.

Collection Scope and Content Note:

The Berry Family Papers primarily contain the Civil War letters of Alonzo Freeman Berry (1846-1929), though there are also a few letters from his brother Albert (1845-1865) and step-brother George Dame (1842-1863). Alonzo Berry was in the 8th New Hampshire Volunteers, an infantryman who served in Mississippi and Louisiana. His letters describe long marches but only one battle, perhaps that at Georgia Landing in October 1862. He became ill and spent about six months (June 1863-January 1864) hospitalized in Baton Rouge; part of that time he describes working as a helper in the hospital. His letters focus on his desire for news from home and his health, with little in the way of descriptions of the countryside, fellow soldiers, or local people and customs. He was discharged in October 1864 and mustered out in January 1865.

Neither Albert Berry nor George Dame survived, both dying of illness before entering battle. As noted above, their father and stepfather, Asa, enlisted in 1861 and died in Louisiana in 1862. It appears that Alonzo was in the same unit as his step-father and re-enlisted after his death. None of this is mentioned in Alonzo's letters (or any in this collection), but it probably explains why all three young men were concerned about sending money to their mother.

Albert Berry, serving with the 12th New Hampshire Volunteers, wrote from Point Lookout, MD, the letters are in several hands, but the reason for this is unstated. His death is documented only by a note from a surgeon in the hospital in which he died telling his mother that he left no effects.

George Dame, serving with the 13th New Hampshire Volunteers, is represented by two letters, both written from Washington, DC. He reports on battles he has heard about but states little about his own activity. There is a letter from his commanding officer describing his death from diphtheria and telling his family where he was buried.

The remainder of the collection consists of ephemera from the fraternal organization Grand Army of the Republic; some masonic items perhaps belonging to Alonzo Berry's son, Charles (1875-1905); and a few other scattered letters from other family members. The materials in this collection date from 1862 to 1924.
