Abstract:

Diary of Harriet Messer (1837-1881), kept intermittently during her adolescence between the ages of 12 and 15 from 1849 to 1852. The diary contains entries on her social activities, neighborhood and family gossip, town news, and her feelings.

Collection Overview

Biographical Information:

Harriet E. Messer (1837-1881) was the daughter and only surviving child of Frederick G. Messer (1799-1889) and Susan Messer (1804-1890). A brother, Fred Messer born in 1841, died in 1843. Frederick and Susan were both born in Vermont, but moved to Colebrook, New Hampshire, and operated a store of some kind in the village: he is listed in the 1850 census as a "trader."

Harriet married Lyman C. Briggs (1831-1886), also born in Vermont, on September 25, 1855 at Portland, ME. They remained in Colebrook until at least 1860, but by 1870 they had moved to Portland where Briggs was a wholesale grocer. Harriet's parents seem to have joined the young couple in Portland, for they appear there in the censuses of 1870 and 1880 and are buried there.

Harriet and Lyman were living at Boston, MA, by 1880. Harriet died of diphtheria at Boston on August 31, 1881. Lyman died there on March 31, 1886. They are buried at Deering, ME. Harriet and Lyman Briggs were survived by at least three children: Mary G. (b. ca. 1857 at Colebrook, NH), Annie M. (b. ca. 1859 at Colebrook), Fred Messer Briggs (1861-1878 at Portland), Susie Briggs (1865-1868 at Portland), and Arthur Carroll Briggs (b. July 21, 1870 at Portland).

Collection Scope and Content Note:

Harriet (or Harriott) Messer (1837-1881) kept a journal intermittently between the ages of 12 and 15 (1849-1852). She tended to write more in the winter, probably because she was unhappily confined indoors. Especially towards the end, the diary is full of adolescent angst: she hated the cold, was bored in Colebrook, felt sad, and cried often. Her social activities included paying and receiving calls, playing whist, attending church, and attending both regular school and singing school. The journal also records neighborhood and family gossip and comments on what were evidently newsworthy events, such as people going to California to find gold; a flying machine exhibit in Boston; paying for an exhibit of pictures shown through a "magic lantern"; the construction preparing for the coming of the railroad in Henniker, NH; and the preaching of a Universalist minister. Though she was sent to boarding school in Henniker in 1849 for a few months and then, in the last entry, one in Concord in 1852, she was too busy to describe those experiences in any detail.
