Abstract:

The John Stark Papers, 1743-1816, consist of correspondence, military commissions, returns of strength, personal and military accounts, personal and military receipts, account books, and other miscellaneous papers of John Stark. John Stark served with Roger's Rangers during the Seven Years' War. During the American Revolution, he served as a Colonel at Bunker Hill and with George Washington in New Jersey during the winter of 1776-1777. Later in 1777, as a Brigadier General of the New Hampshire militia at the Battle of Bennington, his forces defeated British General John Burgoyne's army. He was rewarded with a commission to Brigadier General in the Continental Army, and in 1783 he received a promotion to Major General. Stark retired in 1783 and returned to live in New Hampshire until his death in 1822.

The John Stark Papers were a gift of Arthur Winslow, Cameron M. Winslow, and Sarah Stark Winslow in October 1918. Accession 1935.004 was a gift of Arthur Winslow and Sarah Stark Winslow in November 1935. Accession 1975.034, an account book, was transferred to this collection in August 1975.

Collection Overview

Biographical Information:

John Stark was born on August 28, 1728, in Londonderry, New Hampshire, to Archibald and Eleanor Nichols Stark. His father, who emigrated from Scotland in 1720, moved his family to Derryfield (now Manchester), New Hampshire, in 1736. In 1752 Stark, his brother, and two neighbors were captured by Native Americans while on a hunting trip. Stark was transported to Canada and later ransomed. Shortly before the French and Indian War, he began his military career in Roger's Rangers, serving as a First Lieutenant during the fighting at Fort William and Mary, and at Fort Ticonderoga. After the war, Stark returned to his home and married Elizabeth "Molly" Page, with whom he fathered eleven children.

With the outbreak of the American Revolution, Stark was commissioned a Colonel in the New Hampshire militia and ordered to the Siege of Boston, taking part in the Battle of Bunker Hill. Stark spent the fall and early winter of 1776 in Pennsylvania and New Jersey where he saw action at Princeton under George Washington, and at Trenton under John Sullivan. After this, he returned to New Hampshire to recruit troops and supplies, and learned he had been passed over for promotion in the Continental Army. He resigned his commission and returned home.

Receiving a commission as Brigadier General in the New Hampshire militia in 1777, he headed to Vermont. Ordered by General Philip Schuyler to join the Continental forces at Albany, Stark refused and instead, at the Battle of Bennington on August 16, 1777, checked British General John Burgoyne's advance and prevented Burgoyne from retreating to Fort Ticonderoga and safety. As a result, Burgoyne was forced to surrender.

Appointed a Brigadier General in the Continental Army, Stark prepared for a winter expedition to Canada. In November 1778 he aided General Horatio Gates in the Siege of Newport, and then joined General George Washington in New Jersey, where he took part in the Battle of Springfield. In 1780 he assumed command of the Northern Department at Saratoga. After the threat of British General Cornwallis' invasion from Canada was removed in 1781, he was ordered back to New Hampshire to recruit troops. He remained there due to illness until 1783, at which time he rejoined Washington and stayed until the British left New York in November 1783, ending the War. He retired to his Manchester, NH, home until his death at age 94. He died on May 8, 1822, the last surviving Revolutionary War general.

Collection Scope and Content Note:

The General John Stark Papers, 1743-1816, largely consist of Stark's correspondence for the period 1775-1781. The majority of the correspondence deals with his tenure as commander of the Northern Department in 1778 and 1781. The general subject matter is military: planning, troop movements, orders, reports of enemy activity, and logistics. The correspondence during his command of the Northern Department deals with the defense of Albany, British and Indian movements, and Stark's constant requests for supplies and troops. Several brief accounts of the Battle of Bennington by Stark and others appear in the collection.

Other materials in this collection are numerous returns of troop strength, several detailed expense records, Stark's military commissions, and a number of pay receipts from Stark's men. Personal papers are limited to Stark's finances after 1781. In addition, there is a box of photocopies of Stark's correspondence for 1776-1786 from the Library of Congress. Much of the correspondence is printed in Caleb Stark's *Memoir and Official Correspondence of General John Stark* (1877), p. 107-319, and all printed items are labeled with the pagination to the 1877 edition.

Series 1. Correspondence, 1755-1811

Extent: 26 folders

Scope and Content: Series one, 1775-1811, contains the correspondence of John Stark. The general subject matter is military planning, troop movements, orders, reports of enemy activity, and logistics. The majority of the correspondence deals with John Stark's tenure as commander of the Northern Department in 1778 and 1781. Subjects included in the correspondence from Stark's time as commander in the Northern Department are the defense of Albany, NY; British and Indian movements; and Stark's requests for supplies and troop reinforcement. Other correspondence contains Stark's brief accounts of the Battle of Bennington in August 1777 and congratulator responses from military and political leaders of the time. The series also consists of correspondence from Stark's life after the American Revolution with William Bentley and the committee organizing memorials at the site of the Battle of Bennington.

Extent: 1 folder

Scope and Content: Series two includes four military commissions, 1758-1786. Three of the military commissions were granted to John Stark. The fourth military commission was granted to Archibald Stark. John Stark's brother.

Series 3. Returns of strength, 1775-1781

Extent: 2 folders

Scope and Content: Series three includes returns of strength, mainly from officers within John Stark's regiment. The majority of the returns are from captains who served under John Stark when he was colonel of the First New Hampshire Regiment. Other returns date from Stark's time as commanding officer of the Northern Department in Saratoga, NY, and Albany, NY.

Series 4. Personal and military accounts, 1775-1816

Extent: 1 folder

Scope and Content: Series four contains the personal and military accounts of John Stark from 1775 to 1816. Many of the accounts deal with Stark's time as commander of the 1st New Hampshire Regiment. There are also personal accounts of John Stark including one with details of his salary.

Series 5. Personal and military receipts, 1760-1814

Extent: 1 folder

Scope and Content: Series five contains mostly military and personal receipts belonging to John Stark from 1760 to 1814. This series also consists of money orders and bills. The majority of receipts date from 1775 to 1781 and include military pay receipts of Stark's troops.

Scope and Content: Series six consists of miscellaneous papers related to John Stark and date from 1743 to 1814. Types of materials include a recollection of a Loyalist family, lists, land settlements, a deed, and paper fragments.

Scope and Content: Series seven contains the account book of John Stark for the years 1775 to 1776, which includes information on the pay of Stark's troops during that time. The book also contains a petition for reimbursement of wartime expenses sent to Congress, authored by Caleb Stark on behalf of John Stark.
