#### **Abstract:**

This collection, compiled by Kathleen Van Der Aue, consists of a range of archival materials by or related to the poet, Robert Frost. Such materials include newspaper clippings, brochures, pamphlets, correspondence, stamps, cassettes, and film. This collection is part of a larger library collection and dates from 1909 to 2005, with the bulk of materials dating from 1945 to 1974.

#### Collection Overview

## **Biographical Information:**

<u>Kathleen Van Der Aue</u> of Southport, CT, assembled and donated the collection to the New Hampshire Historical Society.

Robert Lee Frost was born on March 26, 1874 in San Francisco, CA, to William Prescott, Jr., a journalist, and Isabelle (Moodie) Frost, an immigrant from Scotland. Robert's father died in 1885, when Robert was eleven, leaving the family penniless. The family then moved to

Lawrence, MA, where his grandfather was an overseer at a mill. He graduated in 1892 as co-valedictorian with Elinor White from Lawrence High School.

Frost married Elinor White on December 19, 1895, and together they had six children: Eliot (1896-1904), Lesley (1899-1983), Carol (1902-1940), Irma (1903-1967), Marjorie (1905-1934), and Elinor Bettina (1907-1907).

Frost attended Dartmouth College in 1896, but left shortly thereafter. He then attended Harvard University from 1897 to 1899, but did not graduate. In 1900, Frost's grandfather purchased a farm in Derry, NH, for him and his family. They resided here from 1900 to 1909, before selling the farm in 1911. While in Derry, Frost farmed, wrote poems, and taught school at Pinkerton Academy. After the sale of the farm, Frost moved the family to England in 1912, where he published his first poems within a year.

Upon his return to the United States during World War I, he bought a farm in Franconia, NH. He began teaching at Amherst College in 1916, at the Bread Loaf School in 1921, at the University of Michigan from 1921 to 1927, and at Dartmouth College from 1943 to 1949. Frost also traveled extensively, to England, Ireland, Greece, Israel, and a state-sponsored trip to Russia in 1962.

Frost purchased a farm in South Shaftsbury, VT, in 1920 and in 1934, began spending time in Florida. His wife, Elinor, died on March 20, 1938 in Gainesville, FL. In 1940, Frost purchased *Pencil Pines* in South Miami, FL, where he would spend his winters for the rest of his life. He also maintained an apartment in Cambridge, MA.

After the initial success in Europe, his poetry was widely published. He won four Pulitzer Prizes, a Congressional Gold Medal, and read a poem at the inauguration of President John F. Kennedy in 1961. He died in Boston, MA, on January 29, 1963 and is buried with his family in Bennington, VT.

## **Collection Scope and Content Note:**

The Kathleen Van Der Aue Collection on Robert Frost is a small archival portion of a larger library collection of materials on the poet Robert Frost. Compiled by Kathleen Van Der Aue, this portion of the collection consists of newspaper clippings, brochures, programs, correspondence, commemorative stamps, photographs, and audio-visual materials on, by, or about Robert Frost. The materials in this collection date from 1909 to 2005, with the bulk of materials dating from 1945 to 1974.

The majority of this collection consists of newspaper clippings from a variety of sources, not all of which are identified. These clippings include Frost poems, information on his life, events such as his address at Dartmouth College, his death, and a 1981 article on a Japanese professor translating Frost.

The correspondence in this collection is a mixture of letters to and from Frost family members and Kathleen Van Der Aue. Of note is a Christmas Card from Lesley Frost to Marie and Hugh dated 1969 and a postcard from Effie T. Chase to Mrs. E. B. Frost dated March 3, 1909.

Other materials in this collection consist of a cassette of Robert Frost reading his poetry in 1956, and a documentary, *A Lover's Quarrel with the World*. This 1963 documentary is in this collection as both a 16mm film and a DVD and features Frost reminiscing on his life and career. It also includes footage of him giving lectures at Amherst and Sarah Lawrence colleges, daily life at his Vermont home, and receiving the Congressional Gold Medal from President John F. Kennedy.
